So we do have to find a way to strike a balance, because every foot and every tire impacts every rock art site. We're working hard to protect these sites and so we ethically we simply can not become a part of the problem ... The solution so far has been to visit sites only as part of a documentation project or monitoring visit. But there are other kinds of visits that need to be made in order to assess and prioritize sites for documentation and some sites are developed for visitation. So, more field trips to those public sites are in the works, along with longer visits to surrounding areas (like Utah and Arizona) and even a "Find the Logo" field trip is in the works... Jeff Thelen has already offered to cater this affair, so there's no doubt that it will be a great time!

Lecture Series Review & Preview

The NRAF Lecture Series began in February with Dr. Angus Quinlan speaking on "The History of Rock Art Interpretation" and in April Alvin McLane spoke on "Petroglyphs and Associated Features on the Landscape." These presentations are offered every other month on the fourth Wednesday at the South Valley's Library. Doors open at 6:30 and the presentation starts at 7pm - but it's a good idea to come early ... the presentations have brought in around 100 people each time, so those who don't come early risk not getting a seat! Future plans include doing written summaries of the presentations in the Great Basin Glyph Notes, as well as making filmed lectures available. On June 22nd, William Hyder comes to Reno to give a presentation on "Chumash rock art." Bill has been recording and studying rock art since 1979. He served as president of the American Rock Art Research Association from 1994-1998. He has conducted research projects in California and the Southwest including projects for the National Park Service and the California Department of Parks and Recreation. He is the author of a monograph on Chumash rock art and two small press art books, editor of three ARARA volumes, author or co-author of more than forty articles and conference presentations, and his photographs have appeared in a number of books, articles, and art exhibits. We also appreciate his generosity in donating a beautiful panoramic view of Lagomarsino for us to use as a poster - if you haven't seen it, come to the lecture and we'll have one there on display.

In August, Dr. Mary Ricks (who sits on our Advisory Council) will discuss "Rock Art of the Northern Great Basin" - the topic of her Doctoral Dissertation and in October, Ken Pringle will speak on "Coso Rock Art." Since Ken's one of the guys who "wrote the book" on Coso rock art, this program is sure to be great! So mark your calendars and plan on coming and learning more about rock art!

For those of you who live too far away to attend these lectures (although the Crossers drive all the way from Bend, Oregon to come!), we plan on putting a summary of each by the presenters into the Great Basin Glyph Notes and Steve Sterns is working on putting the presentations onto DVD as well... so no one has to miss out!



Code of Ethics

The Nevada Rock Art Foundation subscribes to the following Code of Ethics and encourages its members, as a condition of membership, to abide by the standards of conduct stated herein.

- 1. NRAF members will be respectful at rock art sites many are regarded as sacred by indigenous peoples and as such will be treated as a valued part of our shared cultural heritage.
- 2. All local, state, and national antiquities laws will be strictly adhered to by the membership of NRAF.All research or educational activities taking place at rock art sites shall be subject to appropriate regulations and property access requirements.

- All rock art recording shall be nondestructive with regard to the rock art itself and the associated archaeological remains which may be present.
- 4. NO artifacts shall be collected unless the work is done as part of a legally constituted program of archaeological survey or excavation and with express permission of the land holder.
- 5. No excavation shall be conducted unless the work is done as part of a legally constituted excavation project and with the express permission of the land holder. Removal of soil shall not be undertaken at any time for the sole purpose of exposing subsurface rock art.

Working for the Conservation of Nevada's Rock Art Heritage
